SNAP activities

Detailed below is a list of educational activities you could try with your class, to help them understand different additional needs. You could encourage the children to take this information home, and share it with their families.

To help understand visual impairments

Things you'll need: Blindfolds for half of the class, and an obstacle course that children can be navigated through. How to play: Place the children into pairs. One child must be given a blindfold to wear, while the other child must guide them through an obstacle course. (You can make the course as complex as you like!) The children giving the instructions will need to work out how they are going to guide the other child through the course, and what instructions they are going to give, making sure they are clear. The child being blindfolded will have to put their trust in their partner, while relying on their senses such as hearing and touch, to get through the course safely.



Points of discussion to consider: How did it feel to be blindfolded? Were you comfortable trusting your partner to guide you? Did you prefer wearing the blindfold or giving the instructions?

How to play: Ask each child to put a pair of thick socks on their hands and put a shirt on with buttons. Then get the children to try and do the buttons up, whilst wearing the socks on their hands. This should be a tricky task to do, and will highlight how coordination may be more difficult for some people than others.

To help understand coordination difficulties

Things you'll need: All children participating will be required to wear a pair of thick socks and a shirt with buttons over their clothing.

Points of discussion to consider: How did this activity make you feel? Did you like wearing the socks on your hands, or did you find it frustrating?



To help understand hearing impairments

Things you'll need: No equipment required!

How to play: Ask your class to line up in order of the day and month they were born, from January 1st to December 31st. This task needs to be done without talking to each other, so the children can experience what it is like to complete an activity without hearing. They will need to come up with ways to communicate without using their voices. If they complete this task quickly, you could get them to do different orders e.g. shoe size, or height. You could also challenge them to find and use different methods of communication.



Points of discussion to consider: How did you find this task? Did you struggle not being able to talk? What method of communication did you prefer using?

It is just as important for children to understand hidden disabilities as it is physical disabilities. The National Autistic Society (NAS) have created a great set of school resources for their autism awareness week that can be downloaded for free. The packs they provide are targeted at different year groups, so you will be able to find the one that best suits the ages of the children in your class. Picture this

Put on an art show, and award prizes. Ask parents to pay a nominal entrance fee to enter the gallery at the end of the school day.
